

Greetings!

On 23rd May 2003 four engineering students came out of their hostel in the middle of a night to get a cup of tea. While they were enjoying their tea, a person came requesting them to donate blood. They were shocked that there was a man looking for donors on the street. They immediately went to the blood bank and donated blood. However, by the time they came back, the patient was no more. In that moment of agony and helplessness, they had a choice to make. They went back to the blood bank next morning and requested the blood bank officer to give their contact number every time someone went out of the blood bank without blood. And thus, Sankalp was born. An organisation committed to "Give Life a Better Chance".

We have come a long way. Over the past 12 years, Sankalp has evolved from a group of college students toiling hard to ensure no one in their vicinity suffers due to shortage of blood into a structured organization working with experts and taking Karnataka towards 100% voluntary blood donation and working towards a thalassemia free society. Over the past 12 years, the organization has conducted hundreds of blood donation drives, attended to lakhs of blood requests and provided care and better management to hundreds of children suffering from Thalassemia. Each small step taken has been towards a common goal, a shared vision.

In 2014-15 the organisation received several honours and accolades including e-NGO Award 2014 for organisational efficiency using technology and Spirit of Humanity Awards 2014 for excellence in the field of Thalassemia Care. This encouragement has come at a time when we are laying the framework to deliver world class outcome from our interventions.

The last year also furthered the sustained efforts to increase quality and safety in camps. While we as a nation have made tremendous progress in the field of voluntary blood donation, there is much work remaining in the arena of building a culture of quality and safety. Be it on the academic side, or the implementation side, we continued to persist on making blood donation drives safer and better for everyone involved.

Another large gap in our blood transfusion service is the lack of preparedness to handle extremely rare blood group cares. Here again, the organisation has chosen to build structures and network which ensure that each request of an extremely rare blood group is attended to effectively and efficiently. The year saw the spread of the Bombay blood group network to whole of southern India.

A significant step forward taken by the organisation was to commit to knowledge sharing. Sankalp India Foundation firmly believes that the knowledge that we accumulate as part of our service to the society should be shared and more importantly shared freely. We are committed to making our knowledge public property and accessible to one and all. Putting this intent into action we submitted 2 papers for publication in reputed international journals and both were accepted.

The organisation has also made significant progress in consolidating and organising the various elements of care for children suffering from thalassemia. Some age-old practices that are being followed even in the best centres of the country needed a relook in the technology driven modern era and we set out to ensure value driven and quality oriented care and management of thalassemia. We have chosen to collaborate as far as possible. On fronts where there are unmet needs, we are choosing to bridge the gaps. A significant step forward in the plan to setup a bone marrow transplant centre which would deliver state of the art care and cure from thalassemia.

At Sankalp we believe in action. "Stop thinking and start working" – has always been our mantra. We are happy to share the glimpses of the work done in the year 2014-15.

EMERGENCY TEAM

Emergency wing was the first team of SIF which started with the pledge to do whatever it takes to ensure no one suffers due to shortage of blood. Today the team takes up blood requests which are difficult to be handled by the existing blood stocks in blood banks or by simply getting a few donation done. The team takes up blood requests for extremely rare blood groups, unusual blood products and other corner cases of blood banking. The team prepares and trains itself to handle the difficult situations as and when they come.

Once in a while the blood transfusion needs of a patient become very complicated. Be it because of the patient's clinical situation, be it because of blood availability or be it because of corner cases of blood transfusion medicine. In all such cases, the knowledge and resources available to any one hospital tend to be insufficient to satisfy the need. It is in these situations that the emergency wing of Sankalp India Foundation steps in. The emergency team makes use of the best available medical expertise, latest knowhow in blood transfusion medicine, meticulously setup networks, knowledge acquired over attending to such rare situations, the training and finally firm commitment to save the lives.



HIGHLIGHTS

- 100 emergency donations organised for critical situations. Better preparedness, stock levels, networking and multiple sources for donors which have been put together over the years have led to this situation.
- The Bombay blood group network has been expanded to network **Kerala**, Tamil Nadu, Andhra Pradesh and Pondicherry.

- Two meetings organised with Bombay blood groups donors to ensure a coherent and effective strategy for managing difficult requirements.
- The detection, reporting and sourcing of blood from non-metros especially for extremely rare blood groups improved. Bombay groups units were reported from Bilaspur, Dharwad, Gadag, Kurnool, Udupi and Vellore.
- In last one year, we were able to facilitate the use of **use of alternatives to blood transfusion** in several cases paving way for more judicious blood use.

ROADMAP

The emergency team of Sankalp plans to strengthen networking in the four southern states. Following what the team has accomplished in Karnataka, the network will drill down to the grass root level and reach beyond cities and provide services to places where they are most needed.

Once the four southern states are streamlined, we plan to reach out further and use our knowledge and expertise to help cater to emergency blood requests from the entire country.

The team also plans to foster adoption of tools and techniques which will help optimize use of rare blood groups. One of the identified mechanisms is cryopreservation, a process where blood can be preserved for long durations by cooling to sub-zero temperatures. We are actively pursuing the possibilities to bring the technique into best use.

The team is also striving to create the option of voluntary platelet apheresis on a nonprofit basis available to people in Bangalore.

Abstract

The incidence of Bombay phenotype blood group has been reported to be around 0.01% in various studies 1. The absence of a national rare blood donor programme² similar to the ones available in the USA³ and Europe^{4,5} and the de-centralised nature of blood transfusion services in India make it extremely difficult to organise blood for individuals with these rare

DISHA – THE BLOOD HELPLINE

Blood banking in India continues to be fragmented putting the onus of finding the blood units on the patients. Disha - the state-wide helpline for blood in Karnataka was started with the intent of bridging the gap between the needy and the blood banks. The centralised help-line for blood tracks blood stocks across blood banks in Karnataka and guides the needy patients to the closest blood bank where the blood units they need are available. The help-line works round the clock for all days of the year making blood search simple, reliable and easy. The message "Looking for blood? Call 948004444" has been spread across all hospitals and blood banks besides reaching out to public at large through mass communication.

The helpline manages 30 calls each day on an average and peaking to 60-70 calls during peak shortage.

The number acts as a **centralized helpdesk** for all Sankalp teams. For any help that is needed from Sankalp, one could simply call the helpline.



RAKTA KRANTI

It's only blood available on shelf that lives. Voluntary nonsaves remunerated blood donors are the foundation of a safe, sustainable blood supply. The Rakta Kranti team of Sankalp looks to organize safe and high quality blood donation drives all through the year. Started in March 2007 the aim was to create a movement Karnataka to push 100% towards voluntary blood



donation. Rakta Kranti aims at organizing efficient and well-managed donation drives with standards that are comparable to the best in the world. With focus on donor as well as patient's safety and well-being, we bring to the donor all the information relating to blood donation that makes him/her absolutely comfortable and confident about the process of donating blood. This encourages transition of one time donors into regular blood donors and helps ensure that no one suffers due to shortage of blood.

HIGHLIGHTS

- 151 blood donation drives with 11,827 units of blood collected. 15,712 willing donors in all. This implies 0.5% increase in absolute blood collection, 13.5% increase in donor turnout and 12 more drives than previous year.
- 3 blood donation camps were organised outside Bangalore where 177 units were collected.







- **Drives were organised in 86** institutions/organizations. (40.6%) were organised for the first time in those places.
- 5,683 units were collected during the four summer shortage months from April - July 2014 and 2,416 units in 3 winter months.
- 7,966 (67.4%), units went to government blood banks, 2,581 (21.8%) to Voluntary and remaining to hospital based blood banks.
- 35 camps were first time camps in the company.
- The rate of complications **dropped** from 3.6% last year to 3.3% this year. The post donation complications scientifically were studied and scientifically proven methods to tackle them were introduced. The percentage over last 2 years is 3.6% comparable to international standards. Developed first of its kind complications

management protocol and brought it into practice.

- Our paper on "Complications related to blood donation: A multicenter study of the prevalence and influencing factors in voluntary blood donation camps in Karnataka, India" is submitted for publication.
- Fully customized technology portal for tracking and management of drives including special donor registration app and on-line donor registrations
- Investing in learning and development through regular training for staff, technical teams.

With intense planning and preparation, Rakta Kranti delivers more blood donation drives to the blood banks during the shortage period. We ensure the city gets regular supply of blood all year round.

ROADMAP

Rakta Kranti aims at organizing efficient and well-organized blood donation drives. The team plans to take Karnataka towards 100% voluntary blood donation while sticking to the basic principles the organization has always stood for. We plan to support voluntary blood banks who Issue blood without bias and who are strictly committed to quality, safety and accessibility of blood for one and all.

We plan to achieve this by increasing participation of replacement based blood banks in our camps. As of now, several accomplished blood banks, which are a potential solution to the menace of replacement based blood donation; do not participate in voluntary blood donation camps. Replacement based blood is not the safest blood, as the patient's relative or friend may hide ailment and still donate in pressure. Bringing these blood banks to camps will not only make transfusion medicine safer, but also help take the state towards 100% voluntary blood donation.

Sankalp also plans to reduce complications associated with blood donation. Ensuring less complication will lead to greater donor confidence. The criteria for deferral are another area that the organization wants to streamline. As of now, deferral criteria of blood donors across the country are not streamlined. We plan to strengthen the science behind donor deferral and thereby ensure every single donor eligible to donate blood gets to do so.

In addition, we plan to organize training and skill building sessions for blood bank staff. This, coupled with better implementation of technology will certainly take us towards 100% voluntary blood donation in Karnataka.

PREVENTION MANAGEMENT AND CURE OF **THALASSEMIA**

In June 2011, we visited a hospital in Bangalore to see why we were getting abnormally high blood requests from a single ward. There we came face to face with little children suffering from thalassemia. The children had a haemoglobin of 4-6 gm/dl and the very look in their eyes was that of hopelessness and pain. We were told that they may not survive long and the families had a very difficult time taking care of them. We were given to understand that Thalassemia is a manageable disorder and children suffering from it could have a near normal life. The fact that most individuals born with thalassemia in our country die before the age of 18 years was shocking. We decided to do something about this and thus started the journey of Sankalp to give a better chance to the children suffering from thalassemia.

As of date Sankalp India Foundation supports systematic care and management of thalassemia taking care of 450+ children from Karnataka and neighbouring states in the two thalassemia day care centers at Indira Gandhi Institute of Child Health and Project Samraksha - thalassemia day care run by the largest blood banking institution of Karnataka - the Rashtrotthana Parishat.

We are committed to ensuring that all elements of care are made available to each child in a coherent and harmonious way. Be it blood transfusions, iron chelation therapy, preventive lab investigations, general counselling, thalassemia prevention, support from medical specialities and now the option of cure, all of it is made available to each child attending our thalassemia clinics in a hassle free and friendly manner. We are striving to ensure proper management and good quality of life for each child.



HIGHLIGHTS

- The expression of trust in our delivery of care to the patients can be gauged by the fact that the number of children undertaking support from our centres has reached 427.
- We have strengthened thalassemia management by incorporating quality assured lab investigations which are done as per pre-decided schedule for each child.
- We have ensured universal access to chelation for children with one third of the children under complete support for chelation therapy.
- We have initiated interventions for **complication prevention** including hydroxyurea therapy with positive results.
- A conference was organised for the thalassemia experts treating staff at which practices for management and Thalassemia cure of were discussed.
- The benefits of using technology based systems for management are being recognized and the same are being used in Hyderabad and Mumbai now.



- This year, the first 2 bone marrow transplants from our centre were initiated at South East Asia Institute of Thalassemia, Jaipur. Third is scheduled for April-15.
- 200 families were offered FREE HLA typing to find eligible candidates for transplant with the support from Cure2Children, Italy.
- Sankalp's Program for Thalassemia Cure initiated to enhance Capacity, **Reliability**, and Affordability of BMT in India.

ROADMAP

Sankalp has been working on Thalassemia Management over the past few years. With two active day cares, over 450 children getting benefited, and Sankalp's technology and management strategy reaching out to five other states, we plan to do the following:



- Ensure state of the art management oriented towards complication prevention and good quality of life for patients.
- Use technology, management and networking to minimise the effort and cost involved.
- Transform thalassemia management into a measurable and quality assured service.
- Expand management activity to more centers across the country.
- Enhance cooperation between care centers, thereby enabling knowledge and skill exchange.

THALASSEMIA CURE

With three successful Bone Marrow Transplants in the previous year, we plan to streamline and mainstream the transplant process for thalassemia with success rates comparable to the best in the world.

The organization also plans to establish powerful quality management program for Bone Marrow Transplants to ensure reliability of the procedures with rational use of resources in the Indian setting. This will enable Bone Marrow Transplants become more affordable and hence benefit the greater populace.

The goal for the coming year is to offer 15-25 transplants for thalassemia major children, thereby completely curing them of the disease.

MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS

It has been 13 years since the organisation took its first steps in the direction of giving life a better chance. The following highlights the major achievements:

- Sankalp's 'Rakta Kranti team' has collected more than **60,000 units of blood**.
- Sankalp's State wide Helpline for Blood has received more than **55,000 calls for** blood.
- Sankalp gets 100+ extremely critical blood requests per month.
- The organisation conducts awareness cum motivation programs in schools and has covered more than 12,000 children.
- The organisation is **specialist in extremely rare blood groups** (Bombay blood group) and organises for this blood unit internationally.
- Sankalp supports a thalassemia care centers where 427+ children receive free blood transfusions, medicines and tests.
- Sankalp has organised nation and state wide workshops for training and **education of medical staff** for betterment of transfusion services.
- Sankalp publishes the one of its kind monthly magazine covering blood transfusion medicine and patriotism.
- Sankalp has participated in disaster relief activities Tsunami in Nagapattinum in 2004, Kashmir Earthquake 2005, Flood Relief in Tanjavur in 2005, Bihar Floods of 2007, Terror attacks by arranging for blood, Karnataka Floods 2010, Sikkim Earthquake 2011 and Assam floods 2012.
